I do want to touch on the subject of some of the work ahead of us. There are still a few things on our range we need to improve or complete. The train is badly in need of a complete overhaul and we could use at least one, if not two, more shade buildings. The new outhouses/dressing rooms need some final finishing touches although the recent hard work by Slim and Annie has gone a long way toward reaching that point. Next time you are in that neighborhood, take a gander inside whether you need to or not. The floor in the other outhouse building across from the Oriental is beginning to show a little too much "give" and needs to be replaced. Slim will be calling on volunteers again this year to continue our efforts to improve the range facilities and I expect the Texican Rangers will again provide all the help he needs.

In addition to the physical work ahead, the officers have discussed some other improvements from the standpoint of operating the club. I would like to investigate improving the website, develop manuals for setup and maintenance of the range prior to a match, assemble a library of stage write-ups/scenarios for future use and reference, establish a "committee" to welcome, train and orient new shooters into matches and begin establishing a "roadmap" for future progression of new officers up the management ladder. We will need your help and support to accomplish many of these objectives. I hope I can count on each of you to contribute when and where you can as has always been the case in the past.

But remember I said fun and entertainment were important to me and I believe an important foundation for the club. Well we do still have some awards hanging around from that Wild Bunch match that got rained out last June. We need to use them up and we will be looking at doing so somehow as soon as possible. I am looking forward to some entertaining matches provided by Fatal Star during the summer and even one by Dirty Dog Dale. Then Shindig will be here in no time. Next year we will host our annual Comancheria Days match again and I may be wrong about this but I think 2014 will be the 20th Anniversary of the Texican Rangers. Cat Ballou (SASS #55) has indicated to me that she and Tex (SASS #4) are interested in attending Comancheria Days next year. So maybe I will get to shoot in the Silver Senior Frontier Cartridge Gunfighter category with Tex after all! We have also had discussions about hosting the Texas State Rifle Association (TSRA) Cowboy Action State Championship Match in September 2014 to support the efforts of our gun rights advocates in Austin. It's gonna take some sizeable trophies to hold all that information. But I'll provide more on that later. So raise the flag on Independence Day and I hope to see you on July 13 & 14. Stay cool, stay thirsty and I promise we will plan to shoot rain or shine. Texican Rangers, let's ride!

PROVISIONAL GOVERNMENT DECLARES TEXAS INDEPENDENCE

June 23

"On this day in 1819, a provisional Texas government headed by James Long declared independence from Spain. Long, a merchant from Natchez, was the leader of a filibustering expedition from that city organized in the wake of the controversial Adams-Onís Treaty. By the middle of July, he had more than 300 men under his command and had made overtures for assistance to Jean Laffite in Galveston. By the end of November, however, Spanish troops had succeeded in driving the American settlers out of Texas. The indefatigable Long withdrew to New Orleans, where he joined forces with José Félix Trespalacios and reestablished his base at Point Bolivar. Long soon broke with Trespalacios. He and his men captured La Bahía in October 1820, but surrendered four days later. Long was taken prisoner and sent to Mexico City, where he was shot and killed by a guard reportedly in the pay of his former ally Trespalacios.

“He was an expert trailer and scout. I soon recognized this and....secured his appointment in the United States service...In this capacity I learned to know him and to respect his bravery and ability. He was a whole-souled, brave, generous, good-hearted man....who was one of my dearest and most intimate friends.”

William “Buffalo Bill” Cody, 1910

This friend of Buffalo Bill died on June 28, 1880, turn to page 7 to learn who this famous individual is.....

JOHN BAKER “TEXAS JACK” OMOHUNDRO



One hundred and thirty three years ago on June 28th, Buffalo Bill’s friend, John Baker Omohundro died in Leadville, Colorado of pneumonia, he is buried in the Evergreen Cemetery there.

John Baker Omohundro was born July 27, 1846 in Virginia. Jack loved the outdoors and as a child spent as much time as possible, including often playing hooky from school, hunting, fishing, riding and shooting.

War Between The States

When the war between the states broke out, Jack was only 14 and even though he volunteered to fight, was denied due to his age. Finally, when he reached the age of 16 he was accepted into the army and assigned to his brother Orville’s regiment under the command of Colonel J.E.B. Stuart. Jack soon became recognized for his scouting ability and bravery. He worked directly under Colonel Stuart and became known as the “Boy Scout of the Confederacy”. Often times Jack would move among the Union troops disguised as a chicken peddler or some other tradesman.

Texas Cowboy

“After the war, Jack heard about the great ranches in Texas, with their wealthy owners, and decided that this was the place for him!” Jack first tried to get to Texas by ship but was unsuccessful as the ship wrecked in a storm on the west coast of Florida. He eventually made it to Texas, via horseback.

“Jack stopped at a ranch owned by a man named Taylor and was hired on as a cowboy.” Not long after, he became the head of the ranch, said to be the largest in Texas. Jack began making large sums of money driving cattle from Texas to Nebraska and Missouri. It was during this time that Tennessee was experiencing a severe drought. Jack decided he could help out the folks in Tennessee and at the same time

make some money. He rounded up a large herd of cattle and enlisted the help of a bunch of cowboys and off to Tennessee they went. The route was very rugged and difficult and Jack lost several of his cowboys and some of the cattle to the journey and Indian attacks.

Jack managed to get the cattle to Tennessee. The story goes that when he got to the small town with the cattle someone hollered: “Where ya from?” To which he replied “From Texas, sir.” Another of the townsfolk hollered: “What’s the name?” To which he replied “Jack, sir.” It is reported that the crowd replied “Texas Jack, eh?” And that is supposedly how he got his name, a name that followed him the rest of his life.

While Jack was moving cattle from Texas north he encountered a pioneer home that the Indians had burned to the ground and the husband and wife had been slain. Jack found a small boy, no older than 4 or 5, hiding under the floorboards. Jack took the boy to Forth Worth. Later in life that boy would take the name “Texas Jack, Jr.” “Texas Jack, Jr. was a showman in his own rights and while touring in South Africa he hired a young man named Will Rogers. It was Jack Jr. who taught him how to do lasso tricks and Will Rogers later regarded his association with Texas Jack, Jr. as one of the most important periods of his life.”

US Army Scout

It was on one of his trips driving cattle to Nebraska that Jack met Colonel William F. Cody, a scout in the U.S. Army at Ft. McPherson. “Buffalo Bill, admiring Jack’s ability as a horseman, hunter and marksman, convinced him to stay at Ft. McPherson. Jack, being an ex-Confederate soldier, decided to appeal directly to the Secretary of War to be allowed to serve as a scout. “It is said that Congress had to pass a special act to permit the Secretary to enlist Jack as a US Government Scout.”

JOHN BAKER “TEXAS JACK” OMOHUNDRO

Buffalo Bill and Texas Jack served as hunting guides for visiting European and English nobility. “The Earl of Dunraven, in his book, *The Great Divide*, wrote about his adventures and experiences hunting in Yellowstone and other areas of the great Northwest. He would have no other guide accompany him on his American hunting trips except Texas Jack.”



Stage Star

“In 1872, Buffalo Bill and Texas Jack met in Chicago with dime novelist, Ned Buntline, and decided to accept his proposal to bring to the eastern stage a taste of the adventures which they had experienced on the western prairies as scouts.” The play was known as ‘Scouts of the Prairie’ and met with rave reviews. “Jack thoroughly enjoyed his acting career, and in fact, it is thought by some that he held the act together. Herschel Logan states in his book, *Buckskin and Satin*: ‘Had it not been for the steadying influence of Texas Jack upon Buffalo Bill during that first season, it is doubtful whether or not Cody would have kept on in the show business.’”

Dime Novel

Texas Jack was made famous during the late 1800’s and early 1900’s not only because of his career on the stage but as the hero of many “dime novels” which were popular at the time. “Many of his true life adventures were fictionalized in those exciting little books.”



Buckskin and Satin

Jack first met Josephine Morlacchi while he was appearing in Chicago. Josephine was a dancer and actress from Italy. Morlacchi was appearing in the ‘Scouts of the Prairie’ play and it is reported that while the acting troupe was traveling that Jack and Josephine would spend time together. They were married on September 1, 1873. Their marriage lasted less than seven years as Jack died in Leadville at the age of 33. “Josephine never recovered from her grief, and was not to appear on the stage again, retiring in seclusion to their home in Massachusetts, where she died at the age of 39 of cancer.”

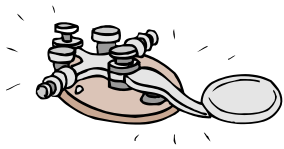

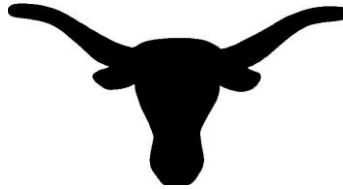

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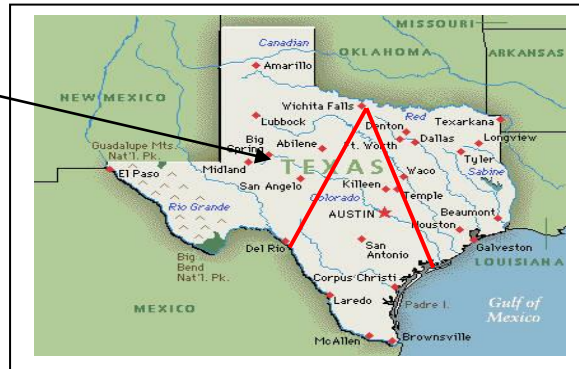
