Howdy Texican Rangers! Well I promised last month to let you know how financially successful **Comancheria Days 2014** was. After all the dust cleared it appears that we wound up with about \$7,348 more in our bank account than when we started. That should cover a lot of range improvements for the future. In part because of that

success, the Executive Committee approved sending \$500 to the SASS Scholarship Fund out of those proceeds from **Comancheria Days 2014**. Also because of the generosity of the shooters at the **Comancheria Days 2014** Banquet in their donations to the TSRA PAC, the club will receive some gun cases being presented by TSRA. What the club will do with those cases will be discussed by the new Executive Committee in June.

Thanks to **GeePee** and **Quintana** at our last monthly match we tried two side matches on Saturday, Long Range and the Shooting Gallery with .22 LR pistols and rifle and 20 gauge shotgun. Shooters participated in both events but I think the increasing heat in the afternoon began eventually to take its toll on the participation. As I mentioned previously, we may be trying to run Long Range on Sunday mornings during the summer months but I will let Quintana expand on that. Quintana is still hard at work preparing the Long Range Stage. Extended roof lines to provide more shade is the most pressing task, but it is well under way.

In my previous life, I have been responsible for managing both projects and organizations with budgets over \$20 million. It is my view that presiding over the operations of the Texican Rangers is very much like managing any other organization. To that end, I think there are three things that need to exist for the club to be sustained into the future. Those are: a sound set of Rules and Procedures, a realistic operating budget, and realistic goals and objectives.

Last year when I was first asked to run for the office of President, I expressed concern that I was coming in with no experience in running the club and some of the existing officers at the time were stepping down. My concern was that there was no plan to ensure continuity in the operations since the By-Laws allowed all officers to be replaced simultaneously each year. So, one of my personal objectives for the next year is to revise the By-Laws to preserve some level of continuity in the election of officers from year-to-year. In addition, the club appears to have at least two sets of written rules for operation of the range and a few more sets of special rules such as Wild Bunch, Long Range and Cody-Dixon. I will encourage and work with the Range Master to combine all those rules into a single book to be available to anyone using our range.

One of the first things I did as we began planning for Comancheria Days last fall was to set up a budget for that event and challenged the officers and match committee to work within that budget. If expenses in one area exceeded the budgeted amount then expenses somewhere else need to be reduced accordingly. I was very proud of the results of their efforts and the match not only stayed within the budget but the proceeds exceeded expectations. So I have begun work on setting up an annual operating budget for the overall club for the year beginning in July, 2014. If re-elected as President I will introduce that budget to the new Executive Committee and propose it for adoption for the next year.

Finally as to goals and objectives, the two previous sets of tasks, revising rules and procedures and establishing a club budget are, in my view, very important and realistic objectives. With a realistic budget to address range improvements, including any new targets, I have an overall goal for 2015 to be the best, most financially successful and the most enjoyable year in our 20 year history.

At the June match the plan is to commemorate the Battle of Walkers Creek which was the first conflict in which the Texas Rangers engaged the Comanche with repeating Colt's Patterson revolvers. The event was an enormous success for the Rangers and Colt's. So if you ever had a hankerin' to shoot those charcoal-burning *pistoles* taking up space in your gun safe, this would be the time. Come out and relive how it all went down.

Finally, **please continue to keep the gates, beginning at the barn, closed at all times!** If there is no one behind you after you pass through the gate then you need to stop, get out of your vehicle and **close and secure the gates**. This of course does not include the electrically operated gate out at the highway.

So for now amigos, stay thirsty and I hope to see you on June 14th and 15th.

THE BATTLE OF WALKERS CREEK..... by Quintana

Captain John Coffee Hays left his headquarters at San Antonio on or about June 1, 1844, with fourteen men of his ranger company to scout the hills to the north and west for a Comanche war party led by Yellow Wolf, which had recently been raiding into Bexar County. The party rode as far as the Pedernales River without encountering hostiles and turned back, following the Pinta Trail to its crossing of the Guadalupe River in the area of present Kendall County.

There, at present day Sisterdale, Texas, the rangers camped on June 9 and had begun to fell a bee tree when Private A. Coleman descried a body of Indians following Hays's trail. A moment later Noah Cheery called from atop the bee tree, "**Jerusalem, Captain, yonder comes a thousand Indians!**" The rangers quickly saddled and mounted, while the Comanche, whose numbers were variously estimated at from forty to upwards of 200 warriors, fell back into a thicket from which they apparently hoped to spring an ambush.


As the rangers-drawn forward by a single horse left out as "bait"-advanced to within a few hundred yards of the hidden Indians, approximately twenty warriors revealed themselves, bantering Hays's men for a fight. The rest of the war party remained concealed in the woods. The rangers, however, refused to fall into the trap.

The entire Indian force then rode forward in line of battle to draw the ranger attack. To the rear of the Comanche ran a dry ravine and beyond that rose a high hill covered with timber and brush and strewn with rocks. Hays's men advanced at the trot while the Indians fell back onto the superb defensive position. From behind rocks and trees they taunted the rangers in Spanish, hoping to provoke a frontal assault.

Hays, however, led his men around the hill, his movement shielded by the ravine, and attacked the Indians line from the rear. The fight for the hill-top, wrote Ben McCulloch, was soon hand-to-hand, and "they took it rough and tumble." The rangers repulsed two counterattacks on their flanks, after which the Indians fled the field and were pursued for three miles under heavy fire from the rangers' revolvers.

"Crowd them! Powder-burn them!" were Hays's orders. At the end of the hour-long battle, Indian casualties were estimated at from twenty to more than fifty killed and wounded, with Yellow Wolf among the slain. Ranger losses amounted to one killed and four seriously wounded. Among the latter were Samuel Walker and Robert A. Gillespie, both thrust through the body with lances. Walker was not expected to live, but he and Gillespie both survived to become highly effective ranger captains in the Mexican War.

The Houston Morning Star characterized the Walker's Creek fight, also known as the battle of Pinta Trail Crossing, the Battle of Asta's Creek, or the Battle of Sisters Creek, as **"unparalleled in this country for the gallantry displayed on both sides, its close and deadly struggle, and the triumphant success of the gallant partisan captain of the West."** This fight marked the first time and entire company of rangers used Colt revolvers in combat, and a Comanche who had taken part in the battle later complained that the rangers "had a shot for every finger on the hand." Reportedly, it is the Walker's Creek fight that is depicted in the roll engraving on the cylinder of the 1847 Colt's Walker revolver.




LONG RANGE AT TEXICAN RANGERS.....by Quintana

Saturday, May 10, 2014, the Texicans **BOOMED** away at down range steel. Very agreeable weather, the aroma of gun powder and a gentle breeze made for an ideal day in the shade of the long range stage.

A big thanks to L.W. Hannabass, Texas Tony, Firefly Judd and Marshal Willy for offering keen ears and sharp eyes for spotting downrange to help tally the rounds of hot lead clanging cold steel.

MAY MATCH RESULTS:

Big Bore shooters, "single action" and "lever action repeaters" engaged targets that were 24 inch square and 16 inch round ranging 100 yards to 200 yards for a total of 8 rounds.

Pistol Caliber Rifle shooters engaged targets from 50 to 200 yards with 11 rounds. Shooters expressed appreciation for being able to shoot their CAS rifles for accuracy at "real" rifle distances. ALL competitors shot the match with rifles supported from a bench rest table. Shooting sticks are available and offhand shooting is welcome. All shooters fired smokeless rounds unless noted otherwise: **30 points is a perfect score.**

Several Rangers shooting both Big Bore and Pistol Caliber expressed (1) a desire to practice sighting in for the various distances out beyond 100 yards and (2) a particular need to determine where their rounds are actually hitting, if not on target. To be effective, you pert near have to address the second before the first can be achieved. Ground conditions along our line of targets are not particularly conducive to making good determinations of bullet contact if it is not on steel. A spotter with a keen eye is often the determining factor in the success of a real sharp shooter, provided one can tell where the projectiles are making contact. The following is a list of ranges in the area that offer targets out to 200 yards or more:

Dietz Range, New Braunfels - 200 yards

Place To Shoot, south San Antonio - 200 yards

The Bullet Hole, west San Antonio - 300 yards

good map for location. The 100 to 500 yard Long Range facility is open one Saturday & Sunday per month with an irregular schedule as to which weekend. You must call or visit to get their schedule. We visited the HC facility and observed large paper targets and solid wood bench rest tables on site.

The optimum set up for sighting-in is to find a private property (*good luck ... we are open to suggestions or invitation*) with the desired distance to safely set up your own targets of choice and take your time at practice. A very large cardboard or paper target helps significantly in pin pointing bullet contact. Large appliance boxes laid flat and rested against a support frame can provide a massive pallet to visualize the bullet impact you are painting. With the help of a good spotting scope and making sight adjustments you should be able to establish a progression of sight settings to record and repeat, as needed.

As you determine the appropriate sight setting for each prescribed distance, a progression of shots should follow to assure “a zeroing” of shot placement for each distance. A grouping of shots will help determine consistency, the quality of the load and equipment and the skill of the shooter.


NEXT MONTHLY MATCH – SATURDAY JUNE 14: ***“Comanche Attack”***

We will commemorate the 170th Anniversary of “the Battle of Walkers Creek” by including the use of one revolver with five shots at a combination of 25, 50 and 75 yards in addition to your choice of rifle with which you choose to compete.

There will always be some other factors to the equation of shooting performance, such as wind, humidity, refinements in bullet, powder and case prep. Those are entirely beyond the scope of this report. However, when shooting only out to 200 yards, our focus here is merely establishing a dependable sight setting. The quality of the sighting apparatus and the ability to effectively read and adjust settings, whether it is a leaf, ladder or vernier tang sight, are key factors.

As mentioned by Mike Venturino in his article titled “ZerOing Rifles” in “**GUNS**” magazine (July 2014), “*A rifle not zeroed in is next to worthless, and almost as bad is a rifle whose zero has not been verified by paper-target shooting.*” Shooting a rifle with little confidence in sight settings for multiple distances of engagement can be frustrating. However, making the effort to establish proper settings with adequate feed-back is essential to properly “zeroing in” and ultimate shooter’s pleasure.




