Pawnee Killer By Dutch Van Horn/Regulator 51153



Pawnee Killer (born 1826) was a leader of the Oglala Sioux. He also led a band of mixed Sioux-Cheyenne Dog Soldiers during the US war against the Plains Indians.

His name was derived from his exploits against the Pawnee, the traditional enemies of the Oglala and allies of the US government.

He was a valid and strong Oglala Sioux warrior about whom little is known.

What is certain is that he lived his experience as a warrior in the most intense period of the clash between the advancing white civilization, albeit with some difficulty, and the culture of the red man who tried to defend himself.

Pawnee Killer was not a real leader, but rather a war leader, one of those warriors who were entrusted with the warlike exploits of a band or a tribe.

He belonged to the Little Wound gang that was stationed quite frequently in the southern regions of the Platte River. And in those areas the Oglala led by Little Wound and Pawnee Killer were sometimes the protagonists of wars against the whites.

The name of the Pawnee Killer gang "Shkokpaya" – also known by the spelling variant Skokpaya – ("Basin" – in a geographical sense) is given by a list compiled by John Colhoff (White Man Stands in Sight) in 1949.

In some cases, the Southern Cheyenne also sided with the Pauux of the Pawnee Killer, especially those of the Turkey Leg gang, a notorious Cheyenne chief with whom the Oglala was quite a friend.

Pawnee Killer: He and Little Wound were both southern Oglala and Pawnee Killer belonged to a gang known as Shkokpaya, generally associated with the Kiyuksa of Little Wound, although he occasionally made independent decisions (such as joining Red Cloud's camp during the Bozeman War, while Little Wound's group preferred to camp around Fort Laramie).

In the decade 1860-70, during the "removal" from the Kiyuksa of Little Wound, (who did not participate in the Bozeman War), the gang of Pawnee Killer temporarily associated with that of the True Oglala of Bad Wound (of which he represented the "extremist" faction).

After the sad events of the Battle of the Sand Creek River in which the Cheyenne suffered enormous damage in terms of human lives, but also loss of property, the Oglala following Pawnee Killer camped near present-day Cheyenne County, Kansas in the company of bands of Arapaho and Cheyenne.

We know that Pawnee Killer was present at the famous Indian attack on Julesburg, Colorado, on January 7, 1865.

In December 1866, he participated in the Battle of Fetterman north of Fort Phil Kearny, Wyoming, the largest defeat of the U.S. Army in the long series of conflicts with the Indians of the American Northwest.

He participated in the attack on Julesburg in Colorado and the Fetterman Fight in Wyoming during Red Cloud's War. He also fought in the so-called Kidder fight in Kansas in 1867 and possibly the Battle of Beecher Island in 1868.

Some rather important friendships with famous leaders of the time are from that period, such as Red Cloud and Blue Horse of the Sioux people, Strong Wolf, Little Wolf and Dull Knife of the Cheyenne, and Black Coal and Eagle Head of the Arapaho.

By mid-April 1867, the people of Pawnee Killer were camping with the Southern Cheyenne in central Kansas when the U.S. Army led by General Hancock raged. It was the classic coup of the blue jackets; the

soldiers arrived suddenly, catching the Indian camp by surprise, to the point that there was almost no reaction. A general fugitive broke out in which only a few warriors remained behind to face the soldiers while the women, the elderly and children, led by the other warriors sought escape fleeing in every direction.

The camp was soon conquered by Hancock who set fire to the tents and everything in them.

In May 1867 Pawnee Killer and Turkey Leg had the opportunity to meet the young Custer for a negotiation, albeit quite short and without an appreciable result, to the point that shortly after breaking up, the Indians of the Pawnee Killer gang and a small group of Cheyenne Dog Soldiers attacked the rear of the column of soldiers. On that occasion there was no loss on either side of the enemy.

The following month, on June 24, 1867, Pawnee Killer and his men clashed with a detachment of the 7th Cavalry under Captain Louis Hamilton near the northern Republican River, Kansas. On that occasion the soldiers soon ended up trapped and risked being completely annihilated by the Sioux, but managed to save themselves from defeat thanks to the scarce armaments available to the Indian warriors. The soldiers, besieged, managed to make a sortie that broke through the Indian line, taking advantage of the firearms that allowed the 45 cavalrymen a considerable advantage over the bows and arrows of the Oglala.

Among the known facts there is also the clash that took place between the Sioux of Pawnee Killer and the "Kidder party" on July 12, 1867. There is no certainty about the presence of the warrior during the Battle of Beecher Island in September 1868, although it is known that his camp was quite close to the area of the clashes.

Around 1869 he is stationed around Whetstone's agency, where he went to complain about an attack on them during a hunt on the Republican River, where some of his band had been taken prisoner. Agent Poole (who describes Pawnee Killer in fairly gloomy colors) then seems to attribute to him the massacre of a group of 12 white explorers also in August of the same year.

During 1869 the Sioux camps that were between the Arkansas and Platte rivers were literally wiped out by the raids of some units of the 5th Cavalry and from that date on the traces of Pawnee Killer are lost, although it is known that the Little Wound tribe (to which the war chief belonged) settled in the Red Cloud reservation in the Dakota where they lived in good harmony.

Pawnee Killer then participated, in August 1873, (along with Little Wound and the Brulé Two Strike) in the so-called "Canyon Massacre" in which a group of Pawnee hunting in the Republican area was attacked by Oglala gangs. At least 150 Pawnees, including women and children, were massacred.

Pawnee Killer was also one of the delegates to Washington in 1875 (for the Black Hills issue), along with other important Oglala leaders such as Red Cloud, Little Wound, American Horse and Bad Wound.


We know that Pawnee Killer died after that date, probably around 1880.

Besides his name, what interested me the most was a habit Pawnee Killer had. Warfare by major Native American tribes was common. They fought against one another for control of territory and its resources, as well as for captives and honor. Add to that the Pawnee Warriors would often scout for the American Army which led to some deep hatred with other tribes.



Pawnee Killer's favorite rifle was his 1866 Winchester Yellowboy. His unique habit that drew me to write this was that every time he killed a Pawnee Warrior he would add another decorative brass tack to his rifle. It is said that upon his death they counted over 100 brass tacks in his rifle. The above picture has 52, so imagine about twice that.

Texas Ranger Main Guns from 1878 until 1894 By Dutch Van Horn/Regulator 51153



We have already talked about the major Texas Ranger guns from 1874 until 1876. They were: the 1860 Colt .44-caliber "Army", the 1870 Smith & Wesson Model 3 American, the 1866 Winchester Yellowboy, and the 1859 Percussion Sharps Military Carbine converted to fire the 50-70 centerfire self-contained metallic cartridge.

I told you the story of how a gun salesman tried to talk Captain Leander McNely into buying 1873 Winchesters instead, but at the time the 1873's were going for about \$50.00 each. Rangers could buy any gun they wanted but the State only provided ammunition for certain approved guns.

Then in 1878 something happened that changed the guns of the Texas Rangers. Availability of the 1873 increased which brought down prices. The new price in Texas for an 1873 Winchester was about \$28.00. In mass the Rangers switched their rifles and the State of Texas brought a huge supply of Winchester .44 Winchester Centerfire Cartridges.

Most Rangers could keep five shots from the 1873 Winchester in a pie plate sized target at 100 yards. They liked the new round so much they recommended all Rangers update their rifles and revolvers both to the .44 Winchester Centerfire Cartridge. So after 1878 most rangers were armed with a Winchester 1873 Rifle and usually a Colt Single Action Army in the same caliber.


It stayed like this even though more modern Winchesters came out waiting for another major change in 1894. This year two things happened: smokeless powder came out and Winchester made the 1894 Rifle in .30-30. The reaction was again, the Texas Rangers in mass switched over to the Winchester 1984 Rifle. The Rangers liked their 30-30's so much it stayed their most popular rifle well into the 20 Centaury.

Guns of the Appaloosa Movie By Dutch Van Horn/Regulator 51153



When the movie Appaloosa came out in 2008, I really enjoyed it, so much so that I have gone back and read the 10 books in the series. The first four books were written by Robert B. Parker, one of my favorite writers. After his death the series was continued by Robert Knott.


Cole & Hitch are the main characters. Cole is Virgil Cole, the new marshal of the mining and ranching town of Appaloosa. Hitch is Everett Hitch, his deputy. Cole & Hitch was a departure for Parker, who usually wrote detective novels until his Wyatt Earp novel Gunman's Rhapsody in 2001, another good read. The Guns of the movie could almost rate star billing. The shooting action was good, however both authors didn't have an understanding of the calibers used in the old west.



Virgil Cole (Ed Harris) carries two Single Action Army revolvers in the film, his main being a 7 1/2" Cavalry model with bone grips and his belt gun/backup a 5 1/2" Artillery. Many other characters use them in the film as well. Both of Vigil's revolvers were supposed to be in .45 Long Colt.

Everett Hitch (Viggo Mortensen) carries a Colt 1871-72 Open Top .44 Caliber Revolver as his sidearm in the film. This is a subtle note in the film but a logical choice, as both his rifle (1866 "Yellow Boy") and his pistol are chambered for the same .44 Henry rimfire cartridge. Everett's back up guns are a 7 ½ Nickle plated Colt Single Action Army and a Remington 2-shot Derringer both chambered in .45 Long Colt. Yes I know that Remington didn't chamber their Derringer for this round.

As I stated above, Everett carried an 1866 Winchester Yellowboy and Virgil had a Winchester 1873 Rifle in.45 Long Colt. Again, another instance of the authors not knowing the actual calibers used in the old west.



I can forgive the mistakes in the guns because the story and acting was so good. To many Western movies have the stars never reload their guns. This is one thing that the authors got right. Every time Cole and Everett fire their guns they immediately reload. The 11th book in the series comes out in September and it is called Opium Rose. Check out the books, and the movie, I think you will like them.






