In Many Ways, Gunsmoke and Have Gun Will Travel were Opposites By Dutch Van Horn/Regulator 51153



At its most basic, *Gunsmoke* was the story of Marshal Matt Dillon and how he kept the peace in rough and tumble Dodge City. Dodge City, known as the Sodom and Gomorrah of the plains, is a typical frontier city of the late 1800s with typical problems ranging from rumored Indian raids to bank and stage robberies, cattle rustling, and family feuds. All of these must be dealt with within the law and that task falls to Matt Dillon, US Marshal (James Arness).

Dillon is a man who prefers the use of logic over the use of the gun but the nature of the people passing through Dodge doesn't always leave him that choice. Aided by various assistants and

deputies over the years (played by Dennis Weaver, Burt Reynolds, and Ken Curtis), he does his best to keep the lawless element out of his town and his territory. Matt often solves his crimes through keen observation and deduction, an innovative approach for the times.



At its most basic, *Have Gun-Will Travel* is the adventures of a gentlemanly gunfighter for hire.

Unlike *Gunsmoke*, *Have Gun — Will Travel* is a lot darker (for its time especially) and a lot more indepth, story-wise and moral-wise. Richard Boone was perfectly cast in the lead role of Paladin, a cultured gunslinger whose West Point education, impeccable style, literate sophistication, and distinguished Civil War service made him unique among Western heroes, and the prototype for many dashing figures to follow. Based in San Francisco's ritzy Carlton Hotel, he scans newspapers to locate trouble throughout the wild West, then cagily markets his services (via his legendary calling card, *Have Gun-Will Travel*) as a hired gun, moral arbiter, voice of reason, and reluctant killer of bad men.

Understanding the complexities of frontier justice, Paladin (whose full name is never revealed) could turn on those who hired him if he suspected dubious motivations. He wore black, but he traveled in an ethical gray zone.



It was clever how in every episode that someone would hold up one of Paladin's cards. I have a friend that to this day says Paladin's first name was Wire because he had it on his card.

A Paladin is a White Knight.

During the time period it was on, 1957 to 1963, Have Gun – Will Travel was the third most popular show on TV. It is interesting to note that is was third behind Gunsmoke, number one, and Bonanza number two.

Both *Gunsmoke* and *Have Gun – Will Travel* were produced by CBS and of course were both Westerns but in many ways the show were exact opposites. Let's take a more in-depth look.

Gunsmoke was a highly successful radio show that was converted to a TV series. Have Gun Will Travel was a successful TV show that was turned into a radio series. Both shows had different TV and Radio actors play the parts.

In *Have Gun Will Travel*, the star Richard Boone was involved in all aspects of the show. He at times wrote, produced and directed various episodes. He was even involved in the hiring of other actors for the show. He ever had approval of other character's costumes (no one else wore black but Paladin). In *Gunsmoke*, the star James Arness only acted. He would show up for this week's episode and have to find out what the plot was and what he was supposed to do. He had approval for Matt Dillon's lines but didn't bother to memorize the script. He would just read cue cards during the filming. This method worked for him and he was praised for the spontaneity he brought to the roll.

Gunsmoke was more of an ensemble cast. There were episodes where James Arness was not even in. He of course had Doc, Chester, and Miss Kitty plus over the years more people as part of the cast every week. Have Gun Will Travel had Hey Boy and Hey Girl but there was never an episode just about them and never an episode without Richard Boone. Richard Boone's Stunt Man, Hal Needham was in every episode even though he was at least 20 pounds lighter than Richard Boone. In have the episodes Hal did double duty as an acting part. In many ways Paladin's guns were part of the cast.

Lastly the cast of *Gunsmoke* was said to be very friendly, they made guest stars feel like family. *Have Gun Will Travel* was more concerned about making a quality show. The guest stars felt pressure to do a good job so they would be invited back for more episodes. Well, *Have Gun Will Travel* was my favorite of the two but it only lasted six years. *Gunsmoke* was on for 20-years, the longest running western series, and it spawned several made for TV Return to Gunsmoke movies.



Major General Ambrose Burnside By Dutch Van Horn/Regulator 51153



Ambrose Burnside had a lack luster military career. When I first started researching him, I had thought he was a vain man, but I found I was mistaken. He seemed to have a lot of bad luck or perhaps he was just aware of his own shortcomings. You be the judge.

Burnside helped organize a regiment of Rhode Island militiamen at the start of the Civil War in 1861, and his unit was one of the first to arrive in Washington, D.C. Burnside served in the early Union defeat at the First Battle of Bull Run (Manassas) as a colonel and was promoted to brigadier general of volunteers shortly thereafter.

In September 1861 Burnside was placed in charge of an expeditionary force in North Carolina, and for the next several months he oversaw a series of raids and amphibious attacks on the southern

coastline. Burnside claimed Roanoke Island and the town of New Bern, North Carolina, with relative ease, and his campaign helped establish a long-lasting base of operations for the Union blockade of the Atlantic coast. Burnside's successes earned him a promotion to major general of volunteers, and the bulk of his force was transferred back to George McClellan's Army of the Potomac. During this time Burnside—known as an exceedingly modest man—twice turned down an opportunity to succeed McClellan as head of Union forces.

Burnside's next major combat operation came as a corps commander during the Maryland Campaign in September 1862. At the Battle of Antietam, Burnside's ineffectiveness in rallying his troops across a stone bridge—later known as "Burnside's Bridge"—resulted in a delayed Union attack, and the battle ended as a tactical draw.

In November 1862 Burnside was ordered to take charge of the Army of the Potomac after McClellan was relieved from duty. He reluctantly accepted and immediately ordered a bold advance toward the Confederate capital of Richmond. Burnside met with heavy delays in crossing the Rappahannock River, which allowed General Robert E. Lee to assemble his Army of Northern Virginia outside the town of Fredericksburg. In the ensuing Battle of Fredericksburg, Burnside's forces made a series of failed frontal assaults against Lee's nearly impregnable defenses, resulting in a decisive Confederate victory and almost 13,000 Union casualties.

Burnside attempted to rally his demoralized army for a second offensive, but the plan—later known as the Mud March—was thwarted by heavy rains and failed to materialize. Believing that his officers had been insubordinate during the campaign, Burnside asked Lincoln to either relieve several generals from duty or accept his resignation. Lincoln chose to remove Burnside from command, replacing him with General Joseph Hooker in January 1863.

Burnside was subsequently assigned to command of the Department of the Ohio in March 1863. The area was known for harboring antiwar sentiment, and Burnside caused a minor controversy when he arrested a politician named Clement Vallandigham on charges of sedition. Burnside next participated in the Knoxville Campaign in the fall of 1863. He outmaneuvered Confederate General James Longstreet and was able to successfully hold the city of Knoxville, Tennessee, until he was reinforced by General William T. Sherman.

In the spring of 1864 Burnside regained control of his old corps and participated in Ulysses S. Grant's Overland Campaign at the Battles of the Wilderness and Spotsylvania Court House. At the Siege of Petersburg in July of 1864, Burnside played a crucial role in an audacious plan to dig a mine under the Confederate position and then detonate explosives to create a gap in the defensive lines. The plan was poorly managed, and Burnside's force sustained 3,800 casualties.

In the wake of what became known as the Battle of the Crater, Burnside was placed on leave. He remained absent from the army until April 1865. At that time, he came back and tended his resignation. This was shortly after Robert E. Lee's surrender at Appomattox.

In closing, Major General Ambrose Burnside was most well-known for his unusual style of facial hair, which included a bushy beard and moustache along with a clean-shaven chin. These distinctive whiskers—originally dubbed "burnsides"—later inspired the term "sideburns." So, he is not famous for his Civil War success, instead he goes down in history as the man that invented sideburns.






