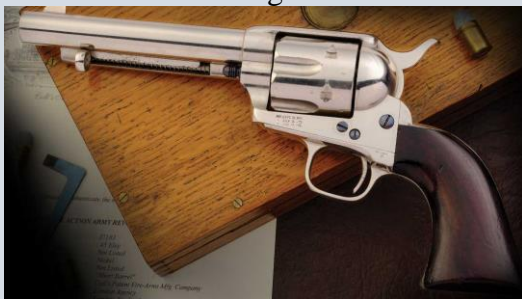

## 150 Years of the Colt Single Action Army and the Winchester Model 1873 From Legends of America



While the Colt Single Action Army conquered the frontier streets, the Winchester Model 1873 became king of the open range. Both guns hit the market during a wave of American expansion and found favor with the lawmen, cowboys, pioneers, outlaws, and Native Americans who came to define the Old West.

To commemorate the sesquicentennial of these two legendary guns, we'll look back at how the Colt Single Action Army revolver and the Winchester Model 1873 rifle rose to prominence in their respected markets and cemented themselves as legends in the world of arms collecting, popular culture, and beyond.



Originally designated the “New Model Army Metallic Cartridge Revolving Pistol” and the “M1873,” the Colt Single Action Army was the brainchild of William Mason, Colt’s Superintendent of the Armory. Unwilling to pay a royalty to Smith & Wesson, who owned the 1855 Rollin White patent on bored-through revolver cylinders for metallic cartridge use, Colt waited until the patent

expired in 1869 to develop their own bored-through cylinder designs.

On September 19, 1871, William Mason received the first of three patents for the design that would become the Colt Single Action Army. Manufacturing began a year later. Once the Single Action Army passed Ordnance Department trials at Springfield Armory, the government placed an order for 8,000 Colt revolvers to be issued to the U.S. Cavalry in July of 1873, the first of many.

John R. Edie, Captain of Ordnance wrote: “I have no hesitation in declaring the Colt’s revolver superior in most respects, and much better adapted to the wants of the Army than the Smith & Wesson.”

Captain Edie was referring to the Smith & Wesson No. 3 American, which had been adopted in 1870. Colt’s SAA revolver had comparatively fewer parts and was viewed as less prone to black powder fouling, traits which helped Colt win the military contract battle. The Colt Single Action Army thrived in this role and became the most prevalent standard Army sidearm in America for the next two decades. Almost all of the first Colt SAA’s

went to the Ordnance Department, with commercial distributors having to wait until 1874 to offer the new revolver in meaningful numbers.

Colt shipped 37,060 Single Action Army revolvers to the U.S. government between 1873 and 1891, while nearly 100,000 were shipped to militaries and police abroad and to the civilian market. The Colt Single Action Army revolver's handling, durability, simple design, and relative affordability made the gun a favorite sidearm in the battle to win the West. The SAA was ideal for belt or saddle carry, and the gun's .45 Colt cartridge provided impressive firepower.

The Colt Single Action Army was advertised colloquially as the "Peacemaker" by one of the largest Colt distributors. This nickname caught on with reporters and dime novelists and endures a century and a half later as the revolver marks its sesquicentennial. One would be hard-pressed to find another mid-19th-century firearm still being manufactured by its original maker 150 years after its introduction. With a Colt Single Action Army, you're holding a piece of history in your hands.



When was the Winchester Model 1873 Rifle released?

As William Mason and Charles Richards were refining the Colt Single Action Army design in Harford, Connecticut, Winchester was working on a new firearm of its own just 45 miles away. Winchester Repeating Arms Company had been producing the "Improved Henry" lever action rifle since 1866.

Though a successful firearm, the Winchester Model '66 was chambered in the .44-caliber Henry Flat rimfire cartridges, which employed a weak 28-grain powder charge, a limitation necessitated by the round's soft copper casing. An upgraded rifle chambered in a stronger cartridge was in order.

Only 18 Winchester Model 1873 rifles left the factory in its first year of production, with a scant 108 rifles shipping in 1874. The following year that figure increased to 3,000 rifles. A marketing campaign that included an elaborate catalog and celebrity endorsements was used to promote the new gun, and the rifle's popularity skyrocketed.

"For Indian, Bear, or Buffalo hunting, it is unrivaled," Winchester's early catalog declared when toting the Model 1873. "The advantage that this Gun possesses over all others for single individuals traveling through a wild country, where there is reason to expect a sudden attack either from robbers or Indians, cannot be over-estimated."

The Winchester Model 1873 carried a broad appeal throughout the American West, including with Native Americans looking for superior firepower. Even while the U.S. military continued to carry single-shot Springfields, the Lakota, Northern Cheyenne, and Arapaho warriors at the Battle of Little Bighorn were equipped with at least eight Model 73 rifles. In a letter to Winchester, Montana pioneer Granville Stuart speculated, "If poor Custer's heroic band had been armed with these rifles, they would have covered the earth with dead Indians for 500 yards around."

The two great guns that won the West found a complementary pairing in 1877 with the Colt Frontier Six Shooter, which was chambered for the same .44-40 WCF cartridge as the Winchester Model 1873 rifle. Carrying only one type of bullet caliber in the saddlebag and on the gun belt was not just a simple convenience, but could be the difference between life and death when seconds counted.

With the Colt Frontier Six Shooter, a cowpoke, lawman, or desperado could take care of business at a distance with their Winchester and draw their Colt for close-quarters trouble. Buffalo Bill Cody purchased a Colt Frontier Six Shooter in 1883, carrying the revolver along with his Winchester lever action rifles during his long-running Wild West Show. Hollywood Westerns seized on this classic pairing, and the image of a well-armed frontiersman carrying a Colt on his hip and a Winchester over his shoulder continues to capture our imaginations more than 150 years after the birth of both legendary gun designs.



The names Colt and Winchester transcend the world of gun collecting. 150 years of taking center stage in dime novels, radio shows, film, and television, have kept the Winchester Model 1873 rifle and the Colt Single Action Army revolver at the forefront of popular culture. From movie sets to modern-day Cowboy action shooting competitions, both guns have stood the test of time like few other firearms and represent the enduring spirit of the American West.

## **Charlie Storms – A Failed Gunfighter**

A professional gunfighter and gambler, Charlie Storms was envious of the reputation of gunslingers such as Bat Masterson and Wild Bill Hickok. Though he was probably not intentionally following them, he tended to wind up in some of the same places. Storms was there when Jack McCall killed Bill Hickok in the Number 10 Saloon in Deadwood, South Dakota. Allegedly, as Hickok lay dead on the floor, Storms grabbed one of his pistols as a souvenir.

However, Storms' career as a gunfighter was never what he hoped it would be. Though he lived through several gunfights in Deadwood, history found his next noteworthy escapade in Tombstone, Arizona. Though some say that Storms arrived as a hired shooter in a bitter contest to control the gambling houses in Tombstone, other historians believe he simply drifted there, like the many other gamblers and gunfighters calling Tombstone home in 1881.

Charlie Storms was fond of his cut-down Peacemaker which was designed for concealment and fast action. His preferred method of gunfighting was at very close range. Most of his victims were shot in the back.

Riding in from El Paso, Texas, Storms immediately made himself known in Tombstone's many gambling houses.

On the morning of February 25, 1881, Storms played faro at the Oriental Saloon, where Luke Short was dealing the game. Storms, who had been drinking all night and was unaware of Short's shooting skills, began to make several rude comments to Short. Just as the two were about to pull out their six guns, in walked Bat Masterson. Friends with both gamblers, Masterson stopped the fight and talked Storms into returning to his room at the San Jose House.

## Have Gun – Will Travel

Available on Heroes and Icons Network

Though it stood in the shadow of bigger series such as Gunsmoke, Have Gun – Will Travel has garnered rave critical praise since its release. The show follows the mysterious Paladin, a gun-fighter for hire who patrols the west.

## Justified

Stream on Hulu

### **Saturday, 4 November Update for the HAVA Family Day**

South Texas Pistoleros (STXP) with the assistance of the Texican Rangers will host a Cowboy Action Shooting (CAS) stage for the Honoring American Veterans Afield (HAVA) event at SAPD Police Academy on 4 Nov 2023.

Stage will consist of one pistol and one rifle firing point. CAS serves as Range Master, coaches/safeties for shooters and loaders (HAVA participants do not load or unload guns.) HAVA provides a Safety Officer for the Bay. Shooters receive familiarization with an unloaded gun or replica at the firing line and then are given the opportunity to fire 5 rounds from a pistol and a rifle. Shooters can go back through as long as time (approx. 25\* minutes per group) and ammunition (approx. 420\* rounds per group) allow. (\* based on 2022 numbers) CAS provides the guns, targets, and manpower. HAVA provides the eyes and ears for participants, ammunition – 3000\* rounds which works out to 420\* rounds per group / 7\* groups and a 100\* round reserve. HAVA staff and volunteers are allowed to shoot. Guests can shoot but must sign waiver and be cleared by HAVA RO. Brass is collected and turned back to HAVA for reloading. (We need to save bad rounds to turn in.)

Cowboys are to dress in full cowboy gear and can wear their leather and pistols after they have been cleared on the range. No ammunition – live or dummy – may be worn on the gun belt. Bring your pistols in a bag.



Range Master will clear pistols before holstering. Cowboys are not allowed to handle or let others handle their firearms - NO EXCEPTIONS. Concealed carry or open carry of a loaded firearm is prohibited unless a certified peace officer whose credentials must be verified by the HAVA Range Officer.

Parking will be at a premium so recommend coming early. HAVA has golf carts running to give lifts to the entry point. Everyone must sign a waiver on arrival. Bring a chair if you want to sit down. Lunch is provided by HAVA.

Water is provided, but recommend you bring your own drinks and snacks just in case.

Dutch Van Horn's display of Old West Guns and photo booth (a real crowd pleaser) will be set up next to the shooting bay. This is the only location HAVA participants can handle firearms other than the firing line.

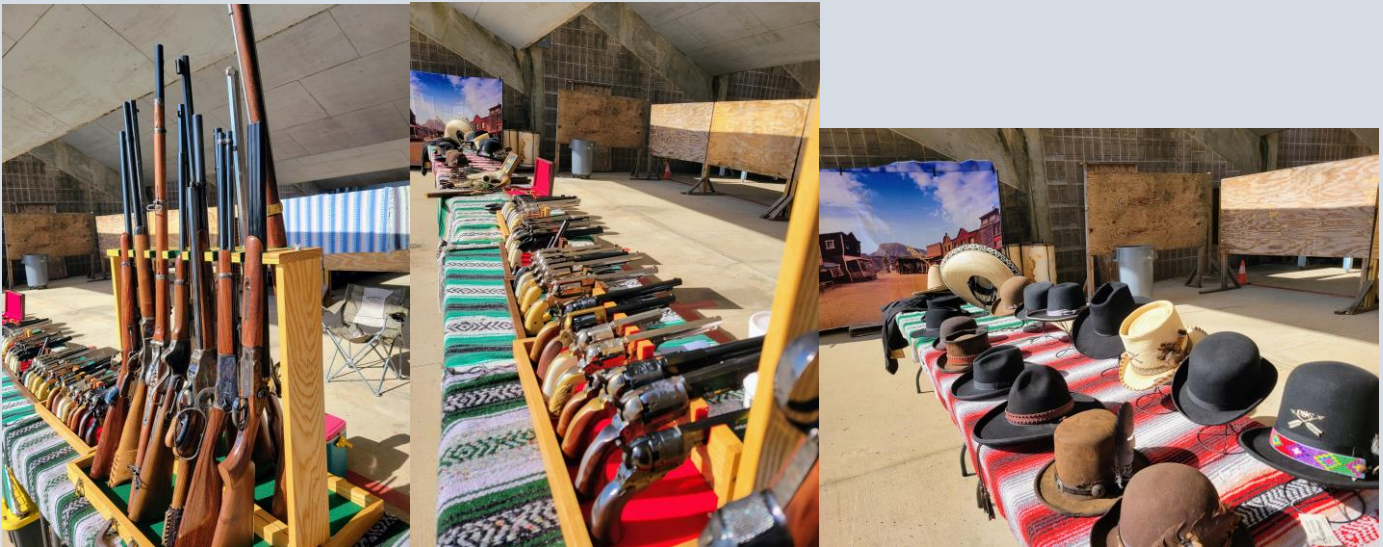
Caprock Kid with load targets after the October STXP Match and store until HAVA. IF the range is open/available, we will set up the day prior. (We won't know until a few days prior so please stay flexible.)

Plan on worst case to set up Saturday morning at 8:00. Depending on rain, we should be able to pull vehicles up to the range to off load. We will need as many hands as we can get for set up. Tear down will be immediately after the last shooter. The load out will be after the awards ceremony. Again, your help is appreciated.

New for 2023 - Cowboy Action Shooting Demonstration. HAVA asked CAS put on a demonstration during the HAVA Introduction. Intent is to show (off) Cowboy Action Shooting and demonstrate the types of firearms we shoot, how a CAS match runs, and possibly a shoot off between two shooters. Our only limitation is we can't shoot shotguns (although we may use blanks or adapters- TBD). We will need all the CAS volunteers at the opening.

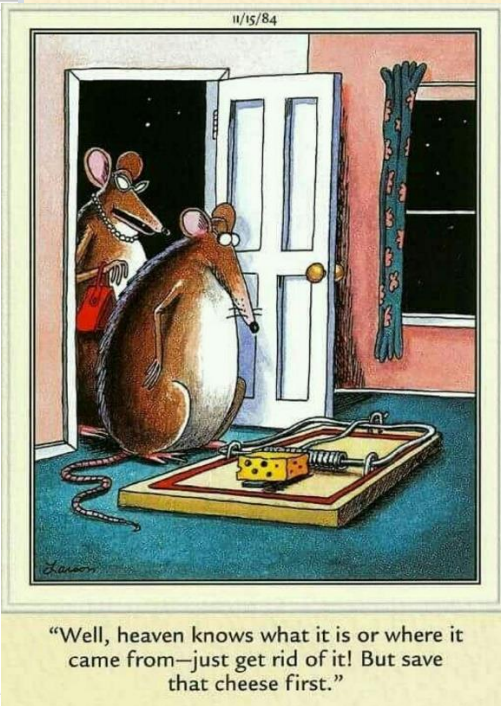
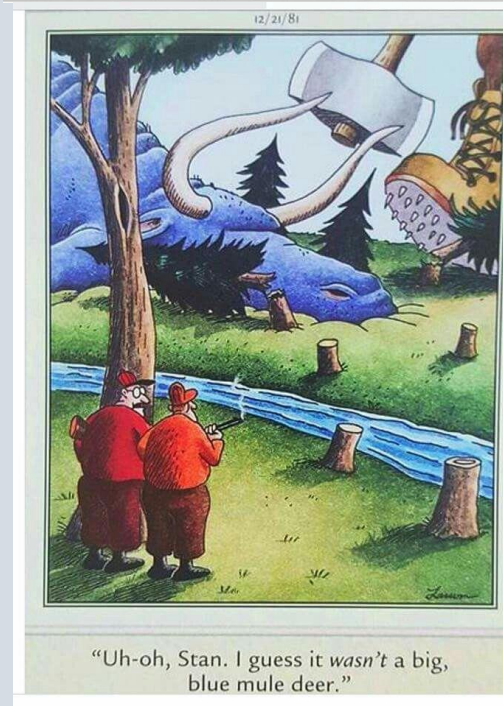
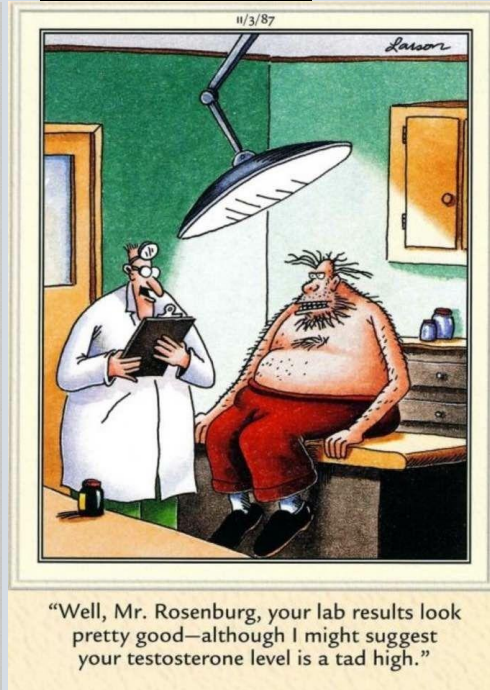
