Colt 1873 Single Action Army Revolver "The Peacemaker" By Dutch Van Horn/Regulator 51153



The Colt 1873 Single Action Army Revolver is perhaps the most iconic handgun ever invented. Its rich and detailed history has been woven into the stories of the Western Frontier that have been passed down through the generations. It has helped to facilitate the larger than life legends of some of the most famous historical figures of the time, such as Wyatt Earp, Doc Holiday, and Billy the Kid. It is a gun that was first brought into existence for the main purpose of arming the U.S. Cavalry, but

quickly became a favorite of gunslingers on both sides of the law. This American classic revolver has now been in production for part of three centuries.

In 'The Pilgrim's Progress: 1620-1875,' a humorous chronology of U.S. history widely published in 1875 newspapers, historian James Hammond Trumbull declared that in 1835 America "Invents the revolver, and sets about supplying the world with it, as a peace-maker."

From the Paterson onward, the concept of the wheel gun as an equalizer was touted by gun dealers around the globe, with no model representing that idea more prominently than the Colt Single Action Army, the favorite peacemaker of the Wild West.

The Single Action Army became known by several names over the years. The Model P, the Equalizer, the Frontier, but probably most famously the Peacemaker. That phrase became popular early on thanks to a Colt distributor named Benjamin Kittredge of Cincinnati, Ohio. He was not the largest Colt distributor but he certainly was in the top five, and Sam Colt quickly realized that he needed to keep his distributors happy and take their good ideas and incorporate them into his company's marketing.

Kittredge first branded the revolver the Peacemaker to help set the Colt apart from the competition, and build its reputation as an easily recognizable firearm. The promotion of Colt's early commercial revolvers relied heavily on the advertising that was mostly conducted by a small and select group of distributors. This handful of dealers, which included Kittredge, were able to receive generously discounted prices in trade for their promotional efforts. Surely such a respectable revolver didn't need a gimmick or any flashy promotion to succeed, but the name Peacemaker fit perfectly with the many tales of gunfighters circulating from the western territories. It became a symbol of power, and demanded respect.

Some of the other marketing names include: The Six Shooter, The Thumb-Buster, and Judge Colt and his Jury of Six. A plethora of nicknames were inevitable for the Colt Single Action Army revolver. Kittredge's marketing name is the one that stuck. 150 years after the Colt SAA was first marketed as the Peacemaker, the name still resonates in the arms collecting community, popular culture, and beyond.

Single Action Army was originally designated the "New Model Army Metallic Cartridge Revolving Pistol" and the "M1873." One name was a mouthful and the other not descriptive enough.

Once Colt's new revolver passed Ordnance Department trials at Springfield Armory, the government placed an order for 8,000 SAAs to be issued to the U.S. Cavalry in July of 1873.

Thanks to its comparatively simple and reliable design, the Colt Single Action Army became the most prevalent standard Army sidearm in America for the next two decades. Almost all of the first Colt SAA's went

to the Ordnance Department, with commercial distributors having to wait until 1874 to offer the new revolver in meaningful numbers, when the revolver was dubbed "The Peacemaker."

The Peacemaker is not the only Colt that Kittredge named. Benjamin Kittredge & Co. of Cincinnati, Ohio, came up with at least nine Colt revolver monikers over the years. Here are just a few. Kittredge devised four nicknames to help promote Colt's Model 1877 DA revolver series, including "Lightning" for the .38 caliber, "Thunderer," for the .41, and "Rainmaker" for the .32 variant. The .45 caliber Model 1878, Colt's first large frame double action revolver, was dubbed the "Omnipotent."

B. Kittredge & Co.'s nickname for the Colt Single Action Army may have been inspired by a quote from Samuel Colt from May 18, 1852, where the famous inventor noted in a letter to Charles Manby, the Secretary of the Institution of Civil Engineers in London, "The good people of this world are very far from being satisfied with each other, and my arms are the best peacemakers."

The Colt Peacemaker designation played to the sentiment that an armed society was a polite society and the mere presence of a Colt revolver could dissuade any troublemakers from picking a fight they might not survive. The platform was viewed as an equalizer for women, the elderly, and those lacking in physical stature, with one popular expression contending that, "God may have made man, but Samuel Colt made them equal."

The Colt "Peacemaker" branding was used throughout gun advertisements, with testaments to the gun's prowess and superiority. The revolver was advertised at \$17.00 for the "best citizens' finish" and \$13.00 for "rejected government finish, but good serviceable arms," likely referring to U.S. contract guns rejected for flaws.



Nickel plating was available for an additional \$1.50, with ivory grips priced at \$5.00. The Colt Peacemaker example pictured to the left, shipped to B. Kittredge & Co. in 1877, and includes both of these optional features.

As a major distributor, B. Kittredge & Co. helped deliver Colt's new revolver into the hands of thousands of settlers, ranchers, cowboys, lawmen, and outlaws who headed West with the railroad, and the Kittredge "Peacemaker" branding traveled with them.

"We deliver at our cost and risk within 1,200 miles and without extra charge," B. Kittredge & Co. touted, with only 50 cents extra beyond that distance. Already becoming a favorite sidearm with the U.S. Army, the Colt Peacemaker would find its way to every corner of the continent, carried on cattle drives, frontier streets, in smoky saloons, and anywhere else someone needed a reliable, affordable cartridge revolver.

When B. Kittredge & Co. first branded the Colt Peacemaker, the only standard factory barrel length was 7 1/2 inches. Shorter lengths like the 5 1/2 inch Artillery Model and 4 3/4 inch Sheriff's Model became available after 1880, though the Peacemaker name could be applied to any .45 caliber Colt Single Action Army, as illustrated by 'Issue 4' of 'Hibbard, Spencer, Bartlett Co. General Catalog' from 1891.

Colt Single Action Armys were all called Peacemakers until Colt introduced additional chamberings, including the .44-40 WCF in 1877. Intended for use in conjunction with the identically chambered Winchester Model 1873, the new revolver allowed a frontiersman to carry ammo for both sidearm and rifle in the same cartridge belt.

The .44-40 was not called the Peacemaker. It instead was known as the "Frontier Six-Shooter." Again it was so named by a company marketing Colt revolvers. In early 1878, Colt executives embraced the Frontier branding and began acid-etching "Frontier Six Shooter" to the side of the barrel.

Estimates show that 82,880,000 people in the United States own at least one firearm in 2023. That is 43% of American households have at least one firearm in 2023. Women's firearm ownership has increased by 177.8% since 1993.

Gun owners could be a powerful political demographic, but we have a problem. About 10,000,000 gun owners are not even registered to vote, and of the remaining 72 million only about 16% actually get out and vote.

As responsible gun owners, if you feel that we need to protect out Second Amendment Rights, we need this to change.

Guns are deeply ingrained in American society and the nation's political debates.

The Second Amendment to the United States Constitution guarantees the right to bear arms, and about a third of U.S. adults say they personally own a gun. At the same time, in response to concerns such as rising gun death rates and mass shootings, the U.S. surgeon general has taken the unprecedented step of declaring gun violence a public health crisis. If we don't want to see our Second Amendment rights taken away, we need more active voters.

I am not going to talk about political parties or issues of the upcoming election. I am just going to say that I recommend that everyone register and vote.

Saturday, 16 November Update for the HAVA Family Day

South Texas Pistolaros (STXP) with the assistance of the Texican Rangers, will host a Cowboy Action Shooting (CAS) stage for the Honoring American Veterans Afield (HAVA) event at SAPD Police Academy on 16 Nov 2024.

You can volunteer for the whole day, or parts of the day. Give Beans a call at (210) 639-8450 if you would like to volunteer. Beans Ahgin, Communications Cowboy, SASS Regulator #65626

Stage will consist of one pistol and one rifle firing point. CAS serves as Range Master, coaches/safeties for shooters and loaders (HAVA participants do not load or unload guns.) HAVA provides a Safety Officer for the Bay. Shooters receive familiarization with an unloaded gun or replica at the firing line and then are given the opportunity to fire 5 rounds from a pistol and a rifle. Shooters can go back through as long as time (approx. 25* minutes per group) and ammunition (approx. 420* rounds per group) allow. (* based on 2022 numbers) CAS provides the guns, targets, and manpower. HAVA provides the eyes and ears for participants, ammunition – 3000* rounds which works out to 420* rounds per group / 7* groups and a 100* round reserve. HAVA staff and volunteers are allowed to shoot. Guests can shoot but must sign waiver and be cleared by HAVA RO. Brass is collected and turned back to HAVA for reloading. (We need to save bad rounds to turn in.)

Cowboys are to dress in full cowboy gear and can wear their leather and pistols after they have been cleared on the range. No ammunition – live or dummy – may be worn on the gun belt. Bring your pistols in a bag. Range Master will clear pistols before holstering. Cowboys are not allowed to handle or let others handle their firearms - NO EXCEPTIONS. Concealed carry or open carry of a loaded firearm is prohibited unless a certified peace officer whose credentials must be verified by the HAVA Range Officer.

Parking will be at a premium so recommend coming early. HAVA has golf carts running to give lifts to the entry point. Everyone must sign a waiver on arrival. Bring a chair if you want to sit down. Lunch is provided by HAVA.

Water is provided, but recommend you bring your own drinks and snacks just in case.

Dutch Van Horn's display of Old West Guns and photo booth (a real crowd pleaser) will be set up next to the shooting bay. This is the only location HAVA participants can handle firearms other than the firing line.

Caprock Kid will load targets after the October STXP Match and store until HAVA. If the range is open/available, we will set up the day prior. (We won't know until a few days prior so please stay flexible.)

Plan on worst case to set up Saturday morning at 8:00. Depending on rain, we should be able to pull vehicles up to the range to off load. We will need as many hands as we can get for set up. Tear down will be immediately after the last shooter. The load out will be after the awards ceremony. Again, your help is appreciated.






